



# Photos Submissions Checklist - Pre-Shooting and Shooting

Research possible trending themes to shoot using [Google Trends](#)

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Research such trending keywords at agencies - could you improve on the top results?

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Start shooting! [Select the right lens](#) and always check images at 100% on viewfinder for focus issues

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Check histogram for possible lighting issues - overexposure or underexposure

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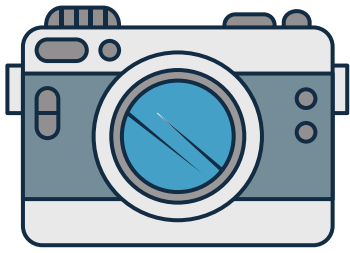
Consider using a tripod under more challenging lighting situations

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Obtain model and property releases, when possible / applicable

# Photos Submissions Checklist - Post-Processing

Always backup your files, just in case

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Organize your files in a logical way, such as by month/date order on a local folder/backup

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Pick your software to post-process  
(Lightroom, Photoshop, etc.)

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Batch edit your files, if possible,  
to speed up your workflow

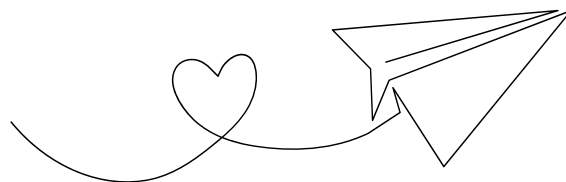
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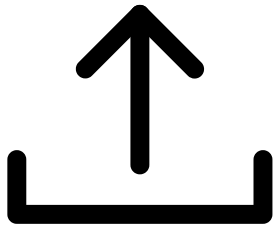
Check again at 100% for issues related to focus,  
lighting and noise and try to mitigate, if possible

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Export at highest resolution to a "shortlist"  
designated folder

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# Photos Submissions Checklist - Uploading to Agencies

Use a specialist keywording software such as Xpiks and Stocksubmitter (also great for uploads to multiple agencies)

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Carefully remove unnecessary keywords and add those that may be more relevant and add the most accurate category

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In case of editorials, caption correctly (Date and Location)

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Include the model and/or property release(s), if applicable

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Check in a few days whether the image(s) was accepted, if not try to understand the rejection reasons (focus / lighting/ noise / composition, etc.)

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Try to fix the rejection reason(s) using post-processing software and resubmit. Further rejections may mean that the image is unsalvageable and need to re-shoot
